Almost everything digital travels through physical infrastructure someone hosts: subsea cables, interconnectors, fibre, towers, satellites' ground stations. New links keep being proposed because demand keeps compounding and the communities asked to host them are hearing louder claims and, often, feeling deeper distrust. This series exists so those communities can engage from knowledge rather than from marketing or fear.

What these sheets are and aren't

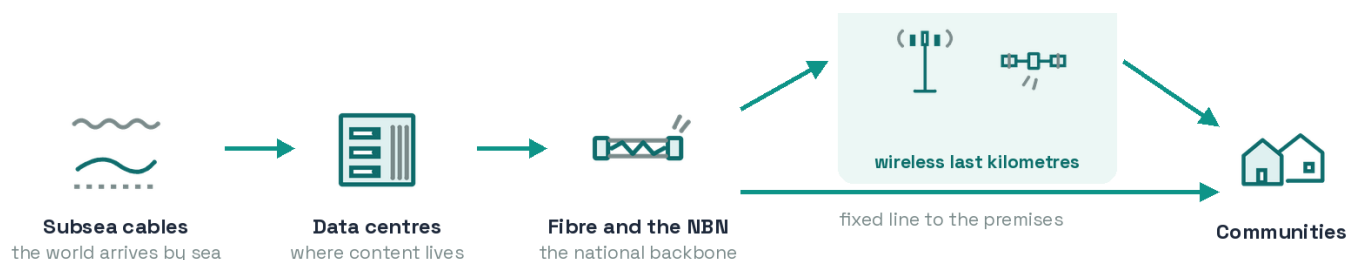
Each sheet is one page on one topic: what each kind of connectivity actually is, why it's built, who approves it and the issues that decide fairness (easements, compensation, marine environment, planning voice). Newer sheets cover mobile networks, satellites and how connectivity shapes where digital infrastructure can go. Every sheet names the national, state and local decision-makers and ends with questions to ask. None advocates for or against any project.

How to use them

- A cable, line or tower proposed near you? Start with its technology sheet, then 07 (easements), 08 (compensation) and 11 (your say).
- Want the whole story? Sheets 01, 02 and 18 explain why connectivity matters and how far it's come.
- Short on time? Sheet 12 is every question in one page; sheet 13 decodes the jargon.
- Project statuses carry a "last checked" date; check the named source for today's position.
